MINUTES OF THE 2018 AGM ON MAY 14, 2018

Present: Pastor Noral Woodburn, Michele Woodburn, Jonathan Durand, Kevin Kajorinne, Phillip Abraham, Debbie Alexander-Thomas, Ken Okhemuokho, Mandi Henn, Gordon Wong, Jane Lowry Kevin welcomed everyone.

- 1. Ken opened in prayer
- 2. Call to Order

a) Jane Lowry recording secretary for the evening.

b) Review of AGM 2016 minutes. 1a should have read; 'Intro of Board members' before the listed names.

c) Introduction of Board member: Kevin, Jonathan, Ken, Abraham and Debbie who is now a staff member of Agapé and no longer has voting rights.

- 3. Chairman's Report Kevin did not read his whole report. He thanked Noral for his leadership. Kevin asked that this report be accepted, it was seconded by Jonathan all agreed.
- 4. Mandi Henn re: reflection from the LEAD teacher. Mandi shared about how she helps her students learn life skills that will help them in Canada. Immigration, Refugees and Citizenship Canada | Immigration, Réfugié et Citoyenneté Canada funded the LINC (Language Instruction for Newcomers to Canada) classes.

This year we averaged 468 returning student registrations and 147 new students for a total of 618 students in our continuous LINC Program. We offer three semesters each year of English language training for students from around the globe desiring to learn English. We partner with ILVARC (Immigrant Language and Vocational Assessment and Referral Centre) to refer the LINC students. A semester at Agapé Language Centre lasts approximately 15 weeks.

During 2018, Agapé Language Centre partnered with IRCC to provide 10 LINC classes ranging from Literacy to CLB 4 every Monday to Friday (mornings & afternoons) and Tuesday and Thursday (evenings).

Agapé Language Centre is honoured that we had the opportunity of meeting the needs of our new neighbours who have traveled from Syria, China, Egypt, Pakistan, Afghanistan, United Arab Emirates, Eritrea, Ethiopia, Iraq, Lebanon, Venezuela, Columbia, and more in 2018.



Special events are part of the learning experience that

students have come to expect when attending Agapé Language Centre. The events are planned primarily to help students become more familiar with Canadian culture while they learn English. Some of the events students participated in were a trip to Stampede Pancake breakfasts, Canada day picnics and the Teddy Bear picnics.

<u>Guest speakers</u> are also an important part of the student learning experience. Agapé invited guest speakers to the school each semester to present to the students and provide them with an opportunity to connect with important resources for their settlements. Depending on the guest, all the classes may be combined, or grouped by levels. Agapé

provides a display of current settlement resources for the students. Guest were provided from LINC Career Services, Calgary Police Depart, AMA, TD Bank, Fire Department and more.

<u>Field Trips</u> help students interact within the non-immigrant community here in Calgary. Some of the trips or activities were to the: Local Libraries, Aggie Days, Calgary Stampede, and the New Central Library in Calgary

Agapé Language Centre recognizes the importance of networking with other organizations and to keep abreast of government updates within the LINC Program. Throughout the year Agapé staff attended LINC Co-ordinator meetings, AAISA collaborative discussions and the ILVARC Advisory Committee meetings. These meetings were very informative as changes to LINC programs, immersing needs, and updates were often discussed.



OPERATIONS MANAGER REPORT

My journey with Agapé began April 30th, 2018. My experience spanned from 22 years in banking in various roles with the last 14 in management and then 4 ½ years with a local non-profit as a Senior Manager in Human Resources and Volunteer Management. I felt God calling me to put my talent to use for His glory, giving His love and grace to others that are so torn by devastation.

Reflecting on my one year, it was something exciting to start as it was different from any role that I had ever tackled before in my career. This brought many challenges for me as I had never worked in a school environment or conversed with individuals that spoke little, or no English and I had to make myself understood. I found out quite quickly, when



God has a plan for your life, He clears all the challenges and shows you what He can do when you release it all to Him. My heart goes out each day for the students at Agapé that have gone through so much in their personal lives and have journeyed to this land of ours called Canada for refuge for their families. 

LEAD TEACHER REPORT

It has been an exciting year at Agapé! In our classes, we strive to teach students to integrate in Canadian society with independence and confidence. We teach them how to interact with Canadians, go to the bank, go shopping, get medical help and talk to their children's teachers. Within our walls, not only are we seeing students' confidence growing, but also the building of friendships and community. Our teachers are frequently going out of their way to listen to students' needs and find ways to address them. Students have discovered that Agapé is not only a safe place to learn English, but also full of people who genuinely care about them and their concerns.



Some of the great highlights of this year are:

- Recently, one of our students dealt with a family emergency. His young son had been diagnosed with cancer. The teachers and students organized a response to meet the family's practical needs and also showed great concern and care. The biggest encouragement was when students from all classes gathered regularly to pray for the young boy and his family. In front of our eyes, students were experiencing the power and community of prayer and were able to see the effects of the hope God gives.
- 2. At the end of each semester, teachers and students have a potluck together to celebrate the progress and hard work that has been put in. At each potluck, students who are graduating out of Agapé are given a graduation ceremony and a certificate. At our most recent graduation, one of the graduating students hosted a BBQ for students and teachers at his house. Agapé saw another outpouring of community-building as other students pitched in with cooking, cleaning and hosting.

These are demonstrations of the environment that students are surrounded by when they learn English at Agapé. The students recognize that there is something different about Agapé. They may not be able to express it or put their finger on it, but we know it to be God's presence and love in our hallways and classes.

On behalf of the teachers, I would like to thank each of you for the support you givefinancially, volunteer time, and, most of all, your prayers. When you invest in Agapé, you are helping us invest in people's lives and give them every opportunity for success. You equip us to represent, not only what Canadians are like, but more importantly, what Christians are like. We take it very seriously that we are, likely, the first Christians our students will ever meet and we strive to display Jesus in an authentic, gentle and truthful manner, representing to the world what it means to follow Christ and live in His hope.

SUCCESS STORY

Norley Contrera Guardo

Norley came to Canada with her family from Cartagena, Colombia. She arrived in Calgary in the cold month of February, 2014. Coming from Colombia where the average temperature is 30+ degrees, to be greeted with blowing snow and a drop in temperature to -20 degrees by the end of that month was quite a change for Norley and her family.

With the help of relatives she was able to get settled in a home in the Coventry Hills area of the city and her children, Mauricio, Juan and Nathalia, were quickly enrolled into the neighborhood schools. Finding work at the time was difficult, but eventually Norley found part



time employment working in the kitchen of a Latin Restaurant. All members of the family spoke only Spanish. It was a difficult time for everyone. The children were able to learn to speak the English language a little quicker by being around new friends and taking all of their classes in English at school.

Norley met many other Spanish speaking people at the restaurant and made friends quickly with all. No need to learn much English because everyone in her circle spoke Spanish. An opportunity came up for Norley to gain employment with a company that cleaned at large retail grocery stores. The owner, Juan, spoke Spanish and most of the other employees were Spanish speaking also. Again, another situation where there really was no need to learn English since most of the interaction would be done in Spanish.

Norley met Brian at one of these grocery stores. An English speaking Calgarian, who managed to fumble his way through conversations with Norley using a Spanglish dialogue. It certainly was entertaining at times. As the relationship grew

between Norley and Brian, so did the need for Norley to learn more English. It was becoming more apparent everyday that Norley needed to learn to speak English..... the interactions with people in the grocery store, the interactions with the children's teachers, meeting new people and the beginning challenges of starting a new company. She realized that she could no longer avoid the need to learn to speak good English.

After a number of years living in Calgary, Norley finally went to the Immigrant Language and Vocational Assessment Centre to get assessed and start the formal process to actually learn a new language. After the assessment was completed, Norley was given schooling options. The best fit and location was the Agapé Language Centre. It certainly was a big step and has worked out very well for Norley. The teachers and office staff have been absolutely wonderful with Norley and the other students. Having Luisa as her first English teacher, was a great experience. Luisa's ability to make all the students feel comfortable and help each student progress is truly amazing. C.J. is Norley's teacher now and a good learning experience has continued. Having Jane and Debbie in the front office area has been wonderful. Everyone goes through difficult moments in everyday life and the openness and understanding of these ladies is truly valued by the students.

Norley started a small business, Delicious from Colombia Inc., producing Colombian style Arepas in 2017. Arepas are a thick patty, made from ground corn. They are used as the base for your favorite topping such as eggs and cheese, chicken or beef, guacamole or vegetables, etc. She started out by producing Arepas and delivering them to customer's homes throughout Calgary. The company has grown quite a bit over the last few years and her business now operates out of an approved kitchen in Airdrie. Norley's Arepas can be found in most of the Latino grocery stores in Calgary. Delicious from Colombia has recently been accepted as a local vendor at a major grocery chain. Her product will be in grocery freezers very soon. Hopefully, the business will continue to grow and there will be opportunity to involve some of her new friends that she has met at school in her business.

INDEPENDENT AUDITORS' REPORT

To the Board of Trustees of AGAPE LANUAGE CENTRE SOCIETY

Qualified Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of AGAPE LANUAGE CENTRE SOCIETY, which comprise of the statement of financial position as at December 31, 2018, statement of operations, statement of changes net assets, and statement of cash flows for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies.

In our opinion, except for the possible effect of the matter described in the *Basis for Qualified Opinion*, the accompanying financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of AGAPE LANUAGE CENTRE SOCIETY as at December 31, 2018 and the results of its operations, changes in fund balances and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations.

Basis for Qualified Opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the *Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements* section of our report. We are independent of the Society in accordance with the ethical requirements that are relevant to our audit of the financial statements in Canada, and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

In common with many not-for-profit organizations, the Society derives revenues from donations, the completeness of which is not readily susceptible of satisfactory audit verification. Accordingly, our verification of these revenues was limited to the amounts recorded in the records of the Society and we were not able to determine whether any adjustments might be necessary to fund raising activities and donations, excess of revenue over expenses, assets and fund balances.

Responsiblities of Management's and Those Charged with Governance for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations, and for such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing these financial statements, management is responsible for assessing the Society's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to a going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless management either intends to liquidate the Society or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative to do so.

Those charged with governance are responsible for overseeing the Society's financial reporting process.

Auditor's Responsibility for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditors' report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

As part of an audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards, we exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit.

We also:

- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to
 fraud or error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks, and obtain audit
 evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion. The risk of not
 detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as
 fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of
 internal control.
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Society's internal control.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates and related disclosures made by management.
- Conclude on the appropriateness of management's use of the going concern basis of accounting and, based on the audit evidence obtained, whether a material uncertainty exists related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the Society's ability to continue as a going concern. If we conclude that a material uncertainty exists, we are required to draw attention in our auditor's report to the related disclosures in the financial statements or, if such disclosures are inadequate, to modify our opinion. Our conclusions are based on the audit evidence obtained up to the date of our auditor's report. However, future events or conditions may cause the Society to cease to continue as a going concern.
- Evaluate the overall presentation, structure and content of the financial statements, including the disclosures, and whether the financial statements represent the underlying transactions and events in a manner that achieves fair presentation.

We communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit and significant audit findings, including any significant deficiencies in internal control that we identify during our audit.

AGAPE LANUAGE CENTRE SOCIETY NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS YEAR ENDED DECEMBER 31, 2018

1. PURPOSE OF THE ORGANIZATION

The Agape Language Centre Society is incorporated under the Societies Act of Alberta as a not-for-profit organization, and is a registered charity under the Income Tax Act. The Society is committed to an outreach ministry to new international neighbours. Our mission is to demonstrate God's unconditional love to our neighbours by meeting their need for English language and acculturation training through high quality interactive instruction in an accepting and affirming atmosphere.

2. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

These financial statements have been prepared by management in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations. The most significant accounting policies are summarized below:

Revenue recognition

Fees for services related to courses and programs are recognized as revenue when such courses and programs are delivered.

Designated contributions are recorded as deferred contributions until spent. Once spent, they are recorded to revenue on the same basis as the expenditure incurred.

Capital Assets

Capital assets are recorded at cost. Assets with per unit cost of \$300 or less for general fund and assets with per unit cost of \$1,000 or less for LINC program are expensed in the year of acquisition. Amortization is recorded on a declining balance basis at the following annual rates:

Computer equipment	30%, 100%, and 55%
Office furniture and equipment	20%

In the year of acquisition, amortization is reduced by one-half.

Contributed services

Volunteers assist the Society in carrying out certain activities. Because of the difficulty in determining their fair value and of the fact that such assistance is generally not otherwise purchased, contributed services are not recognized in the financial statements.

Financial instruments

The Society's financial instruments consist of cash, accounts receivable, and accounts payable and accrued liabilities. Unless otherwise indicated, it is management's opinion that the Society is not exposed to significant interest or credit risks arising from these financial instruments. The fair values of these financial instruments approximate their carrying values at December 31, 2018.

2. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

Measurement uncertainty

The preparation of the financial statements of the Society are in conformity with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations that require management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amount of assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amount of revenue and expenses during the reporting period. These estimates are subject to measurement uncertainty and may differ from actual results.

4. DEFERRED CONTRIBUTIONS RELATED TO CAPITAL ASSETS

Deferred contributions related to capital assets represents the value of capital assets acquired with funds provided by funders. These deferred contributions are recognized as revenue at the same rate as the capital assets are amortized.

5. RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

During the year, the Society made payments related to facility rental expenses, utilities expenses, photocopying fees, janitorial expenses, and group benefits expenses totaling \$47,116 to Beddington Pentecostal Church. Beddington Pentecostal Church and the Society have common Board Directors. The Society also received donations of \$23,000 from Beddington Pentecostal Church. As at December 31, 2018, the Society has no outstanding amounts due to or receivable from Beddington Pentecostal Church. These transactions are recorded at the exchange amount which is the amount agreed upon by the related parties.

6. ECONOMIC DEPENDENCY

During the year, the Society received \$385,744 (2017 - \$433,556) of Government of Canada grants, representing 93% (2017 - 91%) of the Society's total revenue. As such, the Society's future economic viability is dependent on its continuance to receive such funding.
